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#### 2022-23 Course Registration Information

The registration process for the 2022-2023 school year will take place between Monday, January 24 and Tuesday, February 15, 2022. The procedure for selecting courses for the following school year is extremely important and can have a profound impact on successful post-secondary education and career options.

- Jan. 24 Counselors conduct classroom visits with current juniors in their social studies classes.
- Jan. 25 Counselors conduct classroom visits with current sophomores in their social studies classes.
- Jan. 28 Counselors conduct classroom visits with current freshmen in their social studies classes.

Students will receive their course requests forms in their social studies classes. These forms will be taken to their current class teachers for recommendations for the next level. The course description booklet will be available online on the East webpage.

- Feb. 3 Registration Open House for current 9<sup>th</sup>, 10<sup>th</sup> and 11<sup>th</sup> graders 3:30-5:00 p.m.; 7:00-7:30 p.m. More information will be sent home.
- Feb. 9-10 Finalize East registration during homeroom. Course forms will be collected and entered into Infinite Campus via student portal for all students not registered yet.
- Feb. 16-17 East Registration Verification. Parents will receive courses selections and sign off on selections for the 2022-2023 school year and return to East.

As always, students will be guided through the registration process by their homeroom teacher and guidance counselor. Please take the time to discuss course selections with your son or daughter and encourage them to select their courses very carefully. Schedule changes will only occur if one or more of the following criteria are met:

- Requested change by teacher
- ♦ Student failed to meet course prerequisite
- Direct conflict causing student to have less than six classes per semester
- ♦ Change needed to fulfill graduation/college requirement



# Agriscience: Career & College Opportunities



Students who are interested in pursuing further education or a career in Business and/or Marketing can now earn up to 16 free college credits while students at Wausau East for free! How is that possible? NTC and the Wausau East Business department have a transcription agreement where students at East can take classes that teach the same learning objectives students would get at NTC.

The Business classes that offer credit from NTC are Accounting 2 (four credits), Advanced Marketing (three credits), Entrepreneurship & Management (three credits), Personal Financial Management (three credits), and Microsoft Office (three credits). For students who take Microsoft Office, students can earn certifications in Microsoft Word, PowerPoint, and Excel from Wisconsin's Department of Public Instruction.

If your student isn't planning to attend NTC, many four year universities will accept credits from NTC as well. This is a great opportunity for students to save money and time in college. The Wausau East course description book will have a small NTC logo next to the courses that offer credit from NTC. If your student isn't interested in Business and Marketing, there are several other departments that offer free transcripted credit as well.

## Health & Physical Education Department News

Leading an active lifestyle is essential for overall health and wellness. Here at Wausau East the Physical Education Department provides students with a wide range of courses that will help in becoming and staying physically active.

During the month of January, students will have the opportunity to register for their 2022-23 classes (Class registration booklets will be available in the near future).

Student requirements for graduation are:

- 1.5 Physical Education activity credits
- .5 Health Education credits



Freshmen will enroll in Health Education 9 (.5 credits) and Physical Education 9 (.5 credits).

Upper classmen will have their choice of enrolling in:

- Invasion Games
- Net and Partner Games
- ♦ Lifetime Activities
- ♦ Lumberjack Strength
- Foundations of Fitness
- Fall/Spring Adventure Based Activities.

Upperclassmen must complete two of these five activity courses to meet their physical education requirement.

Students cannot enroll in the same course twice for graduation credit, with the exception of Lumberjack Strength and fall/spring adventure based activities.

#### **Current Statistics:**

- 91% of the East students who took IB exams were awarded passing grades in the May 2021 assessment session.
- 100% of last year's Diploma Candidates earned the highly respected IB Diploma from Geneva, Switzerland.
- 46% of our juniors and seniors are taking at least one IB course.
- 25% of our IB students are minority students.
- 26 IB students are Diploma Candidates taking 6 IB courses, the Theory of Knowledge Course, writing a 4,000-word senior thesis, and completing at least 150 hours of community participation and service.

## Social Studies...Don't Leave High School Without It!

Do you know?... Research consistently demonstrates that social studies receives the least amount of instructional time in the elementary grades when compared to the amount of time afforded to other core content areas. This small omission of Social Studies curriculum impacts a student's future as they prepare for college, career, and civic life.

Courses offered in the Wausau East Social Studies Department will help your student to be prepared for whatever path they choose after high school. Please talk to your student and encourage your child to take as many of the social studies elective classes they can in their junior and senior years at East. #### Semester Social Studies Electives

#### Economics (Fulfils district financial literacy requirement)

Economics is a practical, survey course in Macro and Micro Economics with an emphasis on financial literacy. After studying the basic components of our capitalistic system including government, taxes, labor and wages, as they impact the economy, students will participate in a financial literacy unit. Students will set financial goals – invest in the stock market; understand the importance of time value of money and the advantage of investing early. We will also look at credit cards and their proper use, insurance and social security. It is a useful life lesson students never forget.

#### Government

Government studies political issues, citizenship, and the origins and structures of our U.S. Government. Curriculum focuses on current political and social issues facing the nation, state, community, school and individuals with an emphasis on civic engagement.

#### Psychology

Introductory Psychology addresses questions such as:

Do my childhood experiences form my personality?

Does authority shape my behaviors?

Why are my memories inaccurate?

Is my mind different from my brain?

Are my genetics my destiny?

These questions and more are discussed in this semester-long class by exploring classic names in psychology such as Freud, Skinner, Beck, and Milgram.

#### Sociology

Sociology studies different groups and their function and impact within society. Topics such as population, race, gender, and socio-economic status are explored and deeper understood through sociology. Sociology classes open your eyes to how society works and how just one person changing one thing about their daily interactions can cause a huge difference to make our world a better place for all. Sociology explores the roles various groups play in society but more importantly how our participation in society matters.



#### **IB Electives**

#### **IB Cultural Anthropology**

IB Cultural Anthropology analyzes cultures such as the Yanomami of Brazil, Aborigines of Australia, Masai of Kenya, and Haitian Voodoo. Anthropology is taught as a lens through which the student observer employs terms and concepts while noting biases of the research explored in class. This class is a year-long and offers college credit.

#### **IB History I**

When did Europe become "Modern"? In the process of exploring this question, students will study dramatic changes brought by intellectual and artistic movements including the Renaissance and Enlightenment; game-changing revolutions such as the Scientific, French, and Industrial Revolutions; and cataclysmic wars, including the Thirty Years' War, Napoleonic Wars, and World War I. In addition to offering a deep dive into European history, this course aims to build critical thinking skills through analytical reading/writing activities, Socratic seminars, historical re-enactments, and role-plays.



#### IB History II (*This course is open to any senior*)

Contemporary Europe covers Europe from the First World War to the present—arguably the most dynamic time period and region of study in recent history. The yearlong course examines the rise of two competing ideologies-fascism in Nazi Germany and communism in Soviet Russia-and then look at how they clashed in World War II. An extended look at how the United States and the Soviet Union competed to dominate the world during the Cold War. In these conflicts, who were the winners and losers? What happened to those who spoke out or resisted authoritarian regimes? How did women play a leading role in these conflicts? What was expected of children? If you like history and would like to learn more about these topics, IB History II is for you!

#### IB Psychology I and IB Psychology II

IB Psychology introduces students to research methodology and the terms employed in psychological research. Students will understand the purpose of the DSM-V, cultural differences in behaviors, therapeutic approaches, and biological treatments of disorders. This class is a year-long and offers college-credit to those who take IB Psychology I and II.



Students who receive effective social studies instruction including economics, government, psychology and sociology are:

- more likely to vote
- four times more likely to volunteer and work on community issues
- feel more confident in their ability to speak publicly and communicate with their elected representatives

# Youth Apprenticeship (YA)



Do you want exposure to new skills? Do you want to learn about a potential career while working a paid position and earning high school credit? Wausau East High School offers students a unique opportunity to participate in one of eleven Youth Apprenticeship programs in the following career paths/clusters:

One or two-year Youth Apprenticeship programs (taken during junior and senior years) combine academic instruction, technical instruction and paid on-the-job training with an employer. Students can earn high school credit in addition to a state-recognized certificate of occupational proficiency. With the acquired proficiency, students can enter the workforce or go on to post-secondary education with marketable skills.

To be eligible for <u>Youth Apprenticeship</u>, students must display a genuine interest in one of the occupational areas listed above. Students need to register for related coursework during their sophomore/junior/senior year, be successfully meeting high school graduation requirements, maintain a minimum 2.5 GPA and have a satisfactory discipline and attendance record. Students with a GPA of 2.0-2.49 may be accepted with instructor approval. The Youth Apprenticeship program can be competitive, students must be hired by participating employers and complete all requirements.
